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GRACE AND PEACE

In Romans through Philemon, Paul uses the words "grace" and "peace" together in his greetings (Rom. 1:7; I Cor. 1:3; II Cor. 1:2; Gal. 1:3; Eph. 1:2; Phil. 1:2; Col. 1:2; I Thess. 1:1; II Thess. 1:2; I Tim. 1:2; II Tim. 1:2; Titus 1:4; Phile. 3). Peter and John also used it in the letters they wrote (I Pet. 1:2; II Pet. 1:2; John 3; Rev. 1:4).

It's interesting to note that before Christianity came onto the scene, it was not common to combine these words in a greeting. The typical greeting for the Greeks was "grace." The standard greeting for the Jews was "peace." Followers of Jesus took these two greetings and combined them to make the "Christian greeting" of the first century. This is indeed the perfect greeting that represents a follower of Christ, for it, as Christ intended, brings together Jew and Gentile. Christianity is all about bringing together people of different races, cultures, backgrounds, social statuses, etc.

Jesus Christ died to bring all people together under the cross (**Eph. 2:11-16**). Paul emphasizes this in discussing those who have been baptized into Christ. "There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither slave nor free, there is neither male nor female; for you are all one in Christ Jesus" (**Gal. 3:27-28**). Truly the gospel is for all (**Mark 16:15**), and only the gospel can bring all together in unison (**Phil 1:5**).

The greeting of "grace and peace" covers the highest level of spiritual and temporal blessings. To have God's grace means salvation in heaven forevermore and to have peace in every earthly avenue is wonderful, indeed. Or look at it this way, through Jesus we can have the grace that God offers and that brings peace to our souls and lives.

Grace and peace. It is the greatest greeting possible. It has "hi" or "howdy" beat by a long run. Grace and peace. It is what we should strive for in our lives. It is what we should desire for everyone.

"FOUND NOT GUILTY BY REASON OF FAITH..."
