WE MUST GO FORTH IN FAITH

"So Abram went forth as the Lord had spoken to him..." (Genesis 12:4).

When it comes to faith, Abram (later known as Abraham) is the standard to which we strive. He is known as "the believer" (Galatians 3:9). His faith persuaded him to have relations with his wife Sarah when the two of them were long after their childbearing years. His faith later compelled him to be willing to sacrifice his only son who came from this miraculous conception.

In verse 1 before the text, the Lord said to Abram, "Go forth from your country, and from your relatives and from your father's house, to the land which I will show you."

The Lord was asking Abram to make a step into the unknown. He was challenging him to let go of the familiar and comfortable and to go to an unknown place for no other reason than that God said so. Abram went.

Who knows but there might have been others whom God challenged by a command of faith whom we will never know of because they did not obey. They stayed. But, Abram went.

There comes moments when the faith of each one is going to be challenged in a similar way. It will be a command to journey into an unknown land where we otherwise would not travel. It might be the unknown land of sacrifice for God's cause or the unknown land of forgiveness and turning the other cheek or cheerfully enduring injustice as Jesus did. It might be the unknown land of courageously standing under trial where everyone else is crushed and gives up.

"Abram went forth" suggests a turning point, a point of decision. It was where Abram made the choice to venture into a land of dependence upon God. It was a land where his only confidence was the promises of God, his only guide was the star of God's grace and love, and his only sustenance was the word of God.

How many times have we not recognized God's command to us to "go forth?" How many times have we deprived ourselves of a mountain-top journey because we could not see where our journey ended? We each want that, that reassurance that things will be as we want them in this life. But, in the truly spiritual journey, there are no such reassurances. Eventually, each one of us will have to walk blindly, only because God has asked us to "go forth."
