## THE PROOF OF OUR LOVE

The activity we engage in after eating the Lord's Supper is giving. You may call it the "contribution" the "offering" or the "collection."

Although it is not a part of the communion we pass the plates at that time simply because it's a convenient time to do so. It is a matter of expedience.

A congregation I visited in Wisconsin several years ago observed the Lord's Supper at the same time we do here, prior to the sermon. But they took up the offering at the close of the worship. "When" in the worship service the offering is collected is a matter of congregational preference.

Perhaps the "giving" part of the service would be more meaningful and there would be less neglect in participating in it if we recognized that this activity is worship.

Have we forgotten that dropping God's money in the offering plate is an expression of worship? Remember, it's His money; we're simply stewards of it. It is just as much an expression of adoration to God as singing, "Our God, He Is Alive," or as praying, or as eating the bread and drinking the fruit of the vine.

When the wise men from the east worshipped the baby Jesus, their devotion was manifested in the form of "gifts" (**Matthew 2:11**). It is generally conceded that "fellowship" in **Acts 2:42** (surrounded by other items of worship) embraces the act of "giving." Giving is an expression of worship.

In our giving, God gives us an opportunity to prove our love for Him and others. Paul laid down some principles for the saints (and us) to follow in their giving (**II Corinthians 8-9**). He urged them to be ready, willing, regular, generous, cheerful, and sacrificial in their giving. He also told them to "*give proof of your love*" by giving (**II Corinthians 8:24**).

When a Christian neglects the responsibility to "give" of his means unto God, as prescribed in the New Testament, he has refused to worship his Maker, at least in that respect. Hasn't he also failed to give proof of his love? Do you prove your love each Lord's Day?

## **QUESTION: IS THE FAMILY IMPORTANT?**
