Remember how clean and pure you felt when you became a Christian? You made a promise. Be faithful in keeping it.

## **BE HONEST. IS YOUR GOD A BURDEN?**

I may be wrong, but from my perspective, most people feel that God is a burden. I think most people realize they have a need for God, but they struggle with it. For them, God often gets in the way of life, and especially the fun things. God seems to be more tolerated than enjoyed. And there seems to be a lot of guilt and fear and dread in connection with God. Religion that has been reduced to ritual and obligation has become burdensome. People feel obligated to go to church, but they don't really enjoy it. They've fulfilled their duty, but that's about it. It's the same with giving and evangelism and just about anything else God expects. They are just heavy burdens to be borne, more like slavery than freedom.

That kind of a God is not much different from the gods Isaiah wrote about 3000 years ago: "the images that are carried about are burdensome, a burden for the weary." (Isaiah 46:1). We don't have images of stone, wood and metal to tote around, but we do have false concepts of God that are heavy and tiring. Instead of allowing God to carry us, we feel like we have to carry Him. A god like that robs us of the joy that the true God intends for us to experience. They think, "There are so many rules and restrictions. How can anyone possibly keep them all?!" And if you did, what a miserable life that would be.

God, any god, is a burden if we make them ourselves. If our concepts of God are restricted to what we can visualize and design, our God is way to small to lift our burdens, and, in fact, becomes a burden Himself.

How grateful we must be to learn that our God is much greater than our concept of Him. He can do more than we can imagine (Ephesians 3:20-21). He knows more than we can fathom (Deuteronomy 29:29). He didn't begin when we first thought of Him, but is eternal (Hebrews 13:8). A God like this is not a burden, but instead invites us all to "come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). A God like this does not rob us of life's pleasures, but instead has come "that they may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10). A God like this does not make rules that are a burden, but instead guides us to victory (I John 5:3-5). A God like this fills us with love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control (Galatians 5:22-23).

When you get out of the way and let God be God, He is never a burden!
