"But Martha was cumbered about much serving, and came to Him, and said, Lord, dost thou not care that my sister hath left me to serve alone? Bid her therefore that she help me. And Jesus answered and said unto her, Martha, Martha, thou art careful and troubled about many things: But one thing is needful: and Mary hath chosen that good part, which shall not be taken away from her" (Luke 10:40-42).

Most of us, at one time or another, have felt like Martha; that is, stressed out and frustrated while trying to complete a task. And like Martha, we have also found ourselves so engaged in doing something that, after completing whatever it was we were doing, we look back and realize that we missed out on those things that were more important. For example, we work hard at our careers so as to provide a good life for our families, only to miss out on those special moments that only come around once, like a child's first steps, first words, graduation, etc. We become so busy that we miss out on the things that really matter most.

Sadly, many Christians have allowed the various distractions and pleasures of this life to keep them from taking time out for those things that are most important. Tragically, many Christians find themselves in the same predicament Martha found herself in; simply, they are doing things that are honorable and necessary, while at the same time failing to do the things that matter most. What are those things that are most important, you ask? Let's allow Jesus to answer that question: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (Matthew 6:33). Paul stated it this way: "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth" (Colossians 3:1-2).

Martha was so cumbered about with much serving that she lost sight of the One in whom she was serving. Let us not make the same mistake. May we never take our eyes off the One in whom we serve!
