Our first encounter with the preparation dilemma was probably in the fields of academics and sports. As the old song says, "this world is not my home, I'm just a passing through!" That's why Jesus warned, "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal: But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal: For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also" (Mt. 6:19-21).
