## WHO BUILT THE CHURCH?

A question that deserves to be asked is, "Who built the church?" It needs to be asked and answered in many different settings. When people question some aspect of the church's teaching, or its organizational structure, or its pattern of worship, I find myself wanting to ask, "Well, who built the church anyway?"

We know the answer – the Lord Himself. He said, "I will build My church" (Matthew 16:18). We have often rightly pointed out that He used the personal pronoun, "My," to indicate ownership. The right language to use of the church of the Bible is to call it the Lord's church or the "church of Christ" (Romans 16:16). Jesus promised to build a single entity belonging to Him, composed of those whom He would save. He purchased that spiritual body by His blood (Acts 20:28; Ephesians 5:25). He alone paid the purchase price for it. He is the church's Founder (Matthew 16:18), its Foundation (I Corinthians 3:11), its Head (Colossians 1:18), and its Savior (Ephesians 5:23).

When men want to change the church, the question should be asked, "Who built the church anyway?" Since Christ alone built and paid for the church, what right do men have to alter what He built? Do you allow someone to come into your home and start rearranging the furniture or changing the color schemes without your express authorization? No, you would toss someone out who tried it!

Can someone just come into your home and start changing the rules of your house? You have not allowed drunkenness and cursing in your home, but a stranger comes in and says, "These things will now be allowed." What would you do about it?

Yet, many today, some within the church and all the denominations, take it upon themselves to change the Lord's plan for the church. They decide you can just "believe only" into church membership instead of being baptized into the body (I Corinthians 12:13; Mark 16:15-16). They change the frequency of the Lord's Supper to semiannual, instead of weekly (Acts 20:7). They alter music of the church from congregational vocal praise to choirs and solos accompanied by bands (Colossians 3:16). They decide the Lords teachings are unpopular so they change their teaching on morality or marriage and divorce, or just decide NOT to preach it (Matthew 19:9).

When men want to change the "house of God" (I Timothy 3:15) to suit themselves or our culture, we should ask, "Who built the church anyway?" We should react just like we would if they started trying to change our own homes without authority to do so. We should challenge them, and resist their unwarranted changes!
