"Then Agrippa said unto Paul, Almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian" (Acts 26:28).

PAYBACK

When someone takes something, we want to take back. When someone lies, we want to lie and distrust in return. Human nature seems to counter what Scripture says about payback.
